The Old Merchant Taylors are one of our hardy annuals. They have been our visitors on the Rec. on Easter Monday for time immemorial - but we have never played them anywhere else and it does not seem at all likely that we ever shall. Perhaps the greatest players they ever produced were Cove Smith who took the English XV. to South Africa in 1924 and J. E. Raphael. The latter, playing between 1902 - 06 got 9 English caps and was perhaps the best all round threequarter who ever left Merchant Taylors. He was of course playing in John Daniel's and H. T. Gamlin's time.
