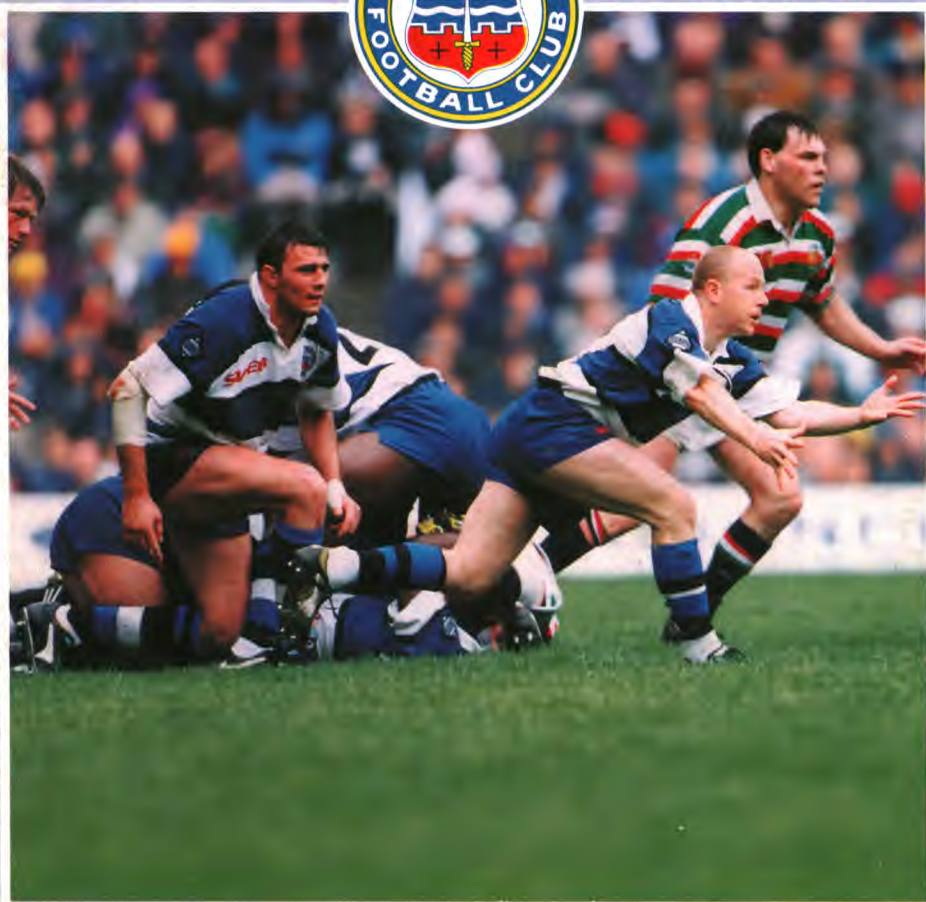

LEICESTER TIGERS FOOTBALL CLUB

As it is 100 years of "Rugby on the Rec" I offer some historical notes on Leicester.

Leicester Football Club were formed on 3rd August 1880 at the George Hotel in the Haymarket, Leicester. Our first match followed on 23rd October at home to Moseley ending in a nil-nil draw.

On 10th September 1892 the first game was played at Welford Road against a Leicestershire XV (won 17-0).

The original club colours were black, but by 1885 these had given way to chocolate and yellow stripes which almost certainly is the origin of the famous Tiger nickname. It is hard to be sure because of the connection we had already established with the officers of the Leicestershire Regiment, whose own sobriquet was Tigers. However, if the name stuck then the shirt did not, for we changed to claret and French grey and then to scarlet, green and white stripes (hoops followed in

1895) which, though there was a hiatus in the early 1900's when we wore white, proved to be the most enduring of them all.

The numbering of players in international matches was first adopted on a regular basis in 1920/21, the Leicester forwards first regularly wore letters in the 1926/27 season. A report in The Birmingham Post on the 6th October 1926 of the match coincidentally against Bath, stated that "Leicester's forwards were picked out easily as their jerseys were decorated with large bold letters - A to G." Lettering was by 1931/32 extended to cover the whole team, however the policy for other clubs changed, some which had originally worn letters throughout with one eccentric exception, the number-eight forward wears "G", and the usual number seven wears "H"!
