## TODAY'S VISITORS L'Aquila

ince joining the Six Nations in 2001, the dub game in Italy has gone from strength to strength.

Three sides now compete in the top echelon of the European game—the Heineken Cup, whilst eight sides will compete in this season's Parker Pen Challenge Cup—a competition that has caught the imagination with its unique two-legged format.

One such side is L'Aquila. In an Italian Super Ten competition dominated by the wealthier Benetton Treviso and Calvisano clubs, L'Aquila have been one of the leading lights in Italian rugby for several years. The club has won the Italian championship five times, with the most recent success coming in 1994. This season will be only their third in European competition having spent last season in the European Challenge Cup. However, it is also interesting to note that the club participated in the Heineken Cup

during the 2000–01 season, although they did not progress past the pool stages.

Last season, the Italian side's Parker Pen Challenge Cup campaign ended at the first hurdle when they went down 133–19 on aggregate to French side Colomiers (who we could meet in the second round). Having dropped into the shield competition, L'Aquila went on to face Dinamo Bucharest—the side that lost out to Saracens and famously lost one of their players, in the processl The matches were close, but went the way of Romanians 61–60 on aggregate. It was a campaign that reflected their domestic season. Despite some big wins, the side, based some 70 miles from Rome, went on to finish eighth in the Super Ten Championship.

So far this season it has been a similar story for L'Aquila. Currently eighth in the table, they recently lost narrowly to Rovigo with their only win of the campaign coming over GRAN Parma.

Despite not having the capital clout of the

big three' available to them L'Aquilians are extremely passionate about their rugby and thrive on a strong community. They are not a side packed with star names. However, they do have one or two internationals of note. Prop Toledo Sanchez and back rower Nicolas Brignoni represented Uruguay in the World Cup and will have come face to face with Iain Balshaw, Mike Tindall and Mike Catt. German Cagnolo, Carlo Caione, Massimiliano De Paolis and Pierpaolo Rotilio have all represented Italy, whilst Hiroaki Ito is a Japanese international and Facundo Lopez has a couple of caps for Argentina.

With a first leg deficit to overcome, the Italian side will be looking for a performance in which they can take some pride this afternoon. If they are to be knocked out of the competition, then the Parker Pen Shield awaits—a tournament which they will believe is there for the taking.
