66 Quins will be looking to get back to winning ways against Bath this weekend **99**

EC Harlequins put the ignominy of relegation to National Divison One in 2004/05 behind them by bouncing straight back into the Premiership at the first attempt.

They then bolstered their squad with an exciting blend of youth and experience. England centre Stuart Abbott, a member of the 2003 World Cup-winning squad, made the switch from local rivals London Wasps and has formed an exciting centre partnership with Welsh international Hal Luscombe, who joined from the Dragons.
Youngsters such as Danny Care, Adrian Jarvis, Jordan Turner-Hall and Mike Brown have also

oppurtunities in the first team.

Since the season began Quins have also signed Craig McMullen and scrum-half Andy Gomersall, who has rejuvenated his playing career at Quins with a string of encouraging performances.

Quins' season began against their great rivals London Irish in the London Double Header at Twickenham. In a close encounter, a Ceri Jones try seven minutes from time looked to have sealed a victory, but Riki Flutey spoilt the party with a dramatic late penalty to give London Irish a 20-19 win.

In Quins' first home Premiership game, they let a ten-point lead slip as visitors Gloucester won 31-21.

discipline led to a third consecutive defeat. A visit from Leicester Tigers followed, which saw Dean Richards face his old club for the first time. Although Quins went into the break 9-5 up and Jarvis scored five penalties in the match, the Tigers left the capital 15-21 winners.

A break from the Guinness Premiership for the EDF Energy Cup gave little respite, as losses to Llanelli Scarlets and Sale put paid to any chance of progress, and back in Premiership action Quins' losing streak continued with an away defeat to Bristol.

But the European Challenge Cup began well, as Quins impressively beat Connacht on their own patch 19-18. When Montpellier visited the Twickenham Stoop, Quins treated fans to an eight try mauling, including a hat-trick by Mike Brown, which left Quins top of pool four.

With this momentum, Harlequins secured their first Guinness Premiership victory of the season at the sixth attempt, an impressive 34-19 defeat of Northampton Saints, followed by their first away league victory at Newcastle (14-3) and then a home win over Worcester (20-6), a run that saw Dean Richards receive the Director of Rugby of the Month award. However, with recent defeats to Sale in the league, Newcastle in the EDF Energy Cup and Bath last weekend, Quins will be looking to get back to winning ways against Bath this weekend in a game that could go a long way to determining who progresses to the next phase of the European Challenge Cun
