Throw in the EDF Energy National Trophy and the season becomes five weeks longer.

Far from being catastrophic, however, the 2007/08 National League One campaign proved to be a cathartic process. In came a new director of rugby, Jim Mallinder, Gardens the team achieved an unprecedented undefeated season. 35 matches, 35 wins and two pieces of silverware later and the Saints were back in the big time.

The last few months have been a bedding in process for Northampton Saints as they look to re-establish themselves as one of the elite clubs in England. As with every summer in the top flight there was more player turnover last summer, notably at scrum-half. In came Alan Dickens (Saracens), Lee Dickson Saint Andre famously said that he would eat his hat if full back was not Foden's best position.

The Guinness Premiership season could not have started any better with a win over Worcester Warriors at Franklin's Gardens. Indeed the Gardens have been a happy hunting ground for the Saints recently with London Wasps, Bristol, Montpellier and the Scarlets all leaving Northampton empty-handed. This home form has been key as the Saints reached the semi-finals of the EDF Energy Cup and the knock out stages of the European Challenge Cup with two rounds to spare.

was the fightback and draw against Bath and the small matter of two red cards and a yellow in the match against Montpellier – although all were for the French outfit!

Away from home it has been a somewhat different story. After leading at Newcastle, Saracens and Leicester at half-time, the team went on to collect a grand total of zero league points. Even worse, in all three games Saints were in a position to earn valuable losing bonus points only to concede late tries. The trip to the Memorial Stadium yielded a first away league point, although Saints were once again in a position to win the game with 10 The only time they have been well beaten was in the last Premiership trip to Gloucester, when the red-hot Cherry and Whites secured the first tryscoring bonus point to be conceded by the Saints this season.

Indeed the only away wins have been in Europe – a stunning 56-3, seven-try success in Toulon and a rather more measured 25-21 win at Bristol two weeks ago.

The EDF Energy Cup semi-final against Cardiff awaits in March, but this and the European success will pale into insignificance if Guinness Premiership survival is not achieved come the end of the
