London Scottish v. Bath

Saturday, April 3rd, 1948.

Kick-off 3.15 p.m.

TO-DAY see the last match of the season on the Richmond Athletic Ground. Bath, who have the honour with London Scottish of concluding the season, are among the oldest half dozen or so clubs in the country. They were founded in 1865, some six years before the foundation of the Rugby Union and are actually 13 years older than the Scottish.

London Scottish have lost their last three matches with Bath. Earlier this season they were beaten at Bath by 7 points to 3. The last victory for the Scottish was the rather overwhelming one of 30 points to 8 on this ground in 1946, one of the occasions when two matches were played in the same afternoon on the main pitch.

Bath earlier this season showed themselves to be a youngish and lively sort of side. T. W. Hicks, in the centre, has pace and the eye for an opening. Among the forwards G. A. Reid supports his backs well and is always up for the likely scoring pass. In their last five matches Bath have only

lost one, a rather heavy defeat by Newport, which is balanced, however, by good victories over London Irish, Taunton and Bristol.

The strength of London Scottish football at scrum half is shown by the fact that the first two choices for this position in the team, K. S. H. Wilson and W. T. Hay, are opposing each other in the last of the Inter-Services' games at Twickenham this afternoon, Wilson for the Army and Hay for the Royal Air Force. Their absence gives another chance to the Ayrshire player, W. G. Lang, in partnership with L. Bruce Lockhart at half back.

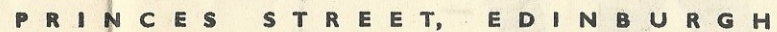
